- **Guest Speaker: Jeff Wilson, Chief of Police**

- The police department has the best and strongest relationship with Supt. Garrett, the principals, their staff, and the school board ever.
- Our community has had a large spike in suicide. Wilson said, “It’s not to imply we are seeing suicides committed, but it’s become a lot larger threat among teens.”
 - The police have worked with the schools this last year, helped struggling students multiple times a week.
 - “It’s probably something that has been going on and we are now more aware and the cases are reported more often.”
- Heroin is on the upswing as well as the narcotic, Fentanyl.
 - Fentanyl is scary. You never know where it is and it can be extremely potent.
 - Many drugs are laced with Fentanyl. Those that are buying a drug that is laced, have no way of knowing until it is too late.
 - All officers and Emergency Medical Services carry Narcan, a medication used to block the effects of opioids.
 - Heroin and Methamphetamines are cheap and fairly easy to find. The OPD are doing their best to stay on top of it with the latest trends, but it is ever changing.
- Another issue the OPD is seeing more often with teens are sexual abuse cases and child abuse cases.
 - There’s more now than Wilson can remember when he started his career.
 - The department receives lots of support from other agencies, which is available even in our small town.
 - These offenses are happening more than most people like to think about.
 - “It’s not just about helping the victim, but also doing what we can in seeking justice in cases that are properly investigated.”
 - Times have changed—most cases involve taking cell phones, tablets, laptops, etc. It is tedious and time consuming. It is difficult for a small department.
 - “We try to go above and beyond for our citizens to the point of contacting agencies outside of our jurisdiction if necessary. We try to pressure them to get things done. There’s not many others that will do that.”
- The murder that happened on May 22, 2017 was something that wasn’t talked about enough according to Wilson.
 - 23-year old Samantha Fignani was murdered in broad daylight just yards away from Wilson’s house at the time.

- Sergeant Frazier was just on his way back into town after from homicide training.
- Any other agency that was two or three times the size of our department would have called for outside help. OPD is one of the best equipped departments to be able to handle what happened.
- They did have help with processing the scene from Clearwater County Sheriff's Office (CCSO).
- When things were starting to be put together about what had happened, they had acquired three search warrants in the first 24 hours. One was for the crime scene where the shooting happened, one for the home and car of the suspect and one for the car and residence of the driver.
- CCSO helped with assisting in taking seizure of those locations until the OPD could process them.
- OPD had it done in 48 hours with a six man team.
- The case was the biggest crime to have happened in our small town, it raised lots of problems between friends and lots of friendships were lost because of they thought was guilty or not guilty.
- Frazier took the lead in putting together a circumstantial case. OPD worked on that case every week for two years. In the midst of keeping other operations afloat.
- There were DNA and gunshot residue that needed to be resolved. OPD has a great relationship with other agencies such as U.S Attorneys' Office, FBI, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, Secret Services and Rocky Mountain Information Network. They sent a lot of that evidence to them to make sure it processed correctly.
- The trial took place in Idaho County and took two weeks. It was first degree murder conviction. The driver has since been charged, so the case isn't fully concluded.
- Biggest advantage of the case was all the surveillance footage obtained that showed the timeline of the suspect's whereabouts.
- The OPD handled the whole case from start to finish. There were things they learned along the way and things would do differently with the information and the knowledge they have now.
